Hope everyone is doing well and staying healthy. You may have noticed the public work vehicles moving around town. It is not City Council or Staff taking the vehicles for joy rides; rather it has been our new public works/maintenance worker Jason Buckentin. Join me in welcoming Jason to the city.

Zummerfest is returning to Hamburg this year. The Hamburg Fire Relief is leading the resurgence. Zummerfest will be held September 23rd. With the later date, a question has been posed to me by a few in the community. That question is: Do we move the City-Wide Garage Sales to the week of Zummerfest or keep them in June? It is a great question. I am asking for feedback on if it makes sense to move it or keep it as is.

March 31st the Community Hall will be bustling with the sounds of bingo balls. The Hamburg Lions will hold their annual Spring Bingo. Doors open at 5 pm and the first ball drops at 6:30 pm. - •If the siren sounds in a steady tone, it means severe weather has been sighted in your area. Seek shelter immediately and turn on a battery-powered radio for more information. Weather officials and safety experts suggest every family should have a weather radio, which broadcasts official Weather Service warnings, watches, forecasts, and other hazard information.
- •If you see that severe weather is approaching, don't wait for the sirens to go off before seeking shelter. In some fast-moving storms, the dangerous weather may pass through before the siren can be turned on. Always seek shelter during Severe Weather, leave the weather spotting to the Fire Department.
- •When the siren stops, it does not mean the severe weather threat is over. It means you should already be indoors, listening to other media for severe weather information.
